The Easter Season!

Sometimes church members think that Easter is only one Sunday, which occurs this year on March 27. After that Sunday, then Easter is over. But, actually, Easter is an entire season! It extends for seven Sundays through Sunday, May 8. All seven Sundays are considered "Sundays in Easter"! It actually extends right up to Pentecost Sunday on May 15, which is the climax of the Easter season.

What does this mean? It means that the Christ Candle will be lit during Sunday services for that entire period of Easter, to celebrate Easter Season. The Christ Candle is traditionally lit for baptisms, funerals, and during Easter Season. It means we will be singing Easter hymns throughout the Easter season. It means that we will say, repeatedly, "Christ is risen!" to which the congregation responds, "Christ is risen indeed! Allelujah!" This will continue throughout the Easter season.

But, most importantly, we should be celebrating! After the 40 days of Lent and our Mid-week Lenten Soup Dinners and Lenten Dramas, after Holy Week with Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services, now we want to celebrate. Easter is truly the high point of the Christian year. Easter is so important that the Church devotes seven weeks to celebrating it!





Legacy Story-John Slaughter



* walked down the Neshaminy Creek with his friends, across the golf ourse and back into Langhorne to reach home. They also hitch-hiked up and down Rt. 413 to go up to Newtown, to visit the various little shops, or to go to the movie theater. Kids had a different amount of freedom in those days. As kids, they were able to be on their own after school as long as they got home in time for dinner, and many weekends were spent camping up along the Neshaminy Creek with friends. John always enlpha joyed the outdoors, going hunting, fishing, canoeing and camping. In * school John enjoyed running on the track team as a sprinter, and he also * was on the wrestling team.

John started working when he was twelve, delivering papers for the Bulletin and also mowing lawns throughout Langhorne Manor. As a young teen, weekends were spent between working at the Penndel carwash and roller skating at the Mammoth Casino Skating Rink located * where Penndel's Burger King is now.

* Another thing Langhorne was known for was racing. There was Langhorne Speedway as well as Road-winders and Pilgrims motorcycle scramble tracks on the North end of town. John grew up watching all sorts of racing and ended up participating in riding scrambles and eventually drag racing Kawasaki Motor Cycles for the shop he worked in as Parts Manager. John's racing career was short lived as it became too time consuming, * with only modest rewards, and he had met Linda who was to become his * wife and the mother of his two children, John (JD) and Kate. As a young family man, John's time became consumed by working, raising a family and attending night school to advance his career, first studying welding and other associated metal fabrication skills, and then business management at Bucks County Community College. John started working as a welding apprentice for a small Bucks County firm named Cartex. After a * few years working in the shop, John became the Supervisor of the welding and maintenance departments. At that time, the company was bought out by a much larger Canadian owned company called Wood-

************** * bridge. John was one of the few who survived the new company's * "takeover" and was fortunate enough to become supervisor and later department manager of brand new much larger shop at the new plant Woodbridge opened. John's career with Woodbridge lasted for thirty years. During this time, John moved into the corporate group as a Project Manager, first traveling around North America for different projects and later around the world to Woodbridge's fifty plus locations. This career came to an end in 2007 as the automotive industry took a major downobline turn, with Woodbridge and the automotive industry as a whole closing numerous plants around the world, especially on the East Coast where there is no longer even one automotive assembly plant left. John also lost his wife after a long battle with cancer in 2006. This became a time of much change in his life. John had joined Redeemer Lutheran Church one year prior, after attending several other churches. His ** church family had given him much support and hope during his difficult * times. John became involved with the Evangelism Committee and it was ohere he had met Edna and John Schwenk. He had heard them talk about of their daughter Karen who works at Penndel Borough. John was a regular volunteer at the Shared Meal Ministry dinner and Karen came to volunteer. John met her and started asking her some questions about borough regulations. They got to chatting and as it is said, the rest is history. John and Karen have many common interests including fishing, canoeing, going to yard sales, running the Redeemer's food pantry and spoiling their on Ty-grandchildren. Karen has a grandson Evan and John's son JD has a son Tyker and a daughter Kylie. John's daughter Kate has a daughter Hazel and is expecting a son in May. John's message to the young people is to stay involved with the church and bring your children to Sunday school so they can learn about Christi-** anity. If they miss that part, it is something they may not get the chance * to learn and understand about later. Sharing God's Bounty April

The End of the Story?

The six-week season of Lent draws to a close. We have heard our Savior's prayer for himself, his disciples, and all of us (John 17). We have been distressed by the disciples' betrayal (Mark 14:50). We have been horrified by the treatment Jesus, an innocent man, received at the hands of his own people and the Roman governor and his soldiers. Our minds have heard the cries, "Crucify him! Crucify him!" (Luke 23:21). Up the hill to Calvary we have trudged with the King of Kings where he was placed on a cross like any criminal, where he spoke words of compassion for others and asked for forgiveness for his enemies, where he died for our sins. We have sat, dejected, like his followers of old – but not quite, for we have an advantage. We know how the story ends!

It ends with Easter! Yet it is not an ending but a beginning! We race to the tomb with Peter and John (John 20:3-9) and rejoice that "He is not here; He has risen!" (Luke 24:6). Like the women who were the first to learn of this most miraculous, most marvelous, most salutary event, we run to tell others. We want to share this Good News. We know it's hard to believe. Like Paul says, "Very rarely will anyone die for a righteous man, though for a good man someone might possibly dare to die. But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners Christ died for us" (Romans 5:7-8). And lives for us! "Do you believe this?" Jesus asked Martha, and with her we confidently answer, "I believe that [he] is the Christ, the Son of God, who was to come into the world" (John 11:24-27).

"Death has been swallowed up in victory. Thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my dear brothers, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labor in the Lord is not in vain" (1 Corinthians 15:54, 57-58).

The attitude of Christian Stewardship recognizes that one's own special tal-ents were given by God. These skills could have been given to someone also. But they were given to you to use for God's purpose. The same attitude of stew-ardship recognizes time as a loan made by God to his children. Manage time well.

"Which of these three was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him,.....

A spring is a place where groundwater naturally gushes or seeps from the earth. It might take the form of a stream of water that flows from a fissure in a rock, or a persistent puddle in a low spot in a field.

Water may be clean when it emerges from the earth, but it can easily be contaminated before use. Animals can walk through the persistent puddle; leaves and insects can fall into it; it may flow through a contaminated area. However, if the spring is protected, the water stays clean. A spring box is an

economical and effective way to protect a spring.

These covered concrete boxes simply enclose the spring so that debris cannot fall into it and animals cannot walk through it. The spring fills the box from the bottom or from one side, and a pipe built into the side of the box at a convenient height allows people to fill their containers. A well-built concrete spring box can last for decades with only the simplest occasional maintenance: The concrete lid can be lifted to reach the inside of the box for cleaning.

These spring boxes are not just shipped in and installed though. Instead they are constructed by members of the community who become participants in their own development. This practice honors local leadership and involvement and acknowledges the skills within the community: essential marks of accompaniment.

Make these cute treats as a reminder that Jesus our Savior is also the Lamb of God.




What you need:
